I am pleased to present the *Advocacy Report on the 99th Michigan Legislature*. This report provides a detailed review of the advocacy efforts of Michigan Catholic Conference (MCC) at the State Capitol during the 2017–2018 legislative session.

Over the past two years, staff reviewed hundreds of bills introduced in both the State Senate and House of Representatives. These measures were analyzed with an eye toward the common good and a drive to promote the dignity of the human person. Guided by its framework document *A Blueprint for the Common Good*, MCC advocated for measures that would assist the marginalized and forgotten, enhance school choice, defend the rights of immigrants and migrants, speak to the truth of the human person, and maintain the vital role of the traditional family as a cornerstone for strong communities. These efforts resulted in victories for low-income families, student safety, pregnant mothers, and dozens of additional policies that enhance the well-being of every Michigander.

The work of rising above partisanship or favor continues to occupy a diminishing space in the political sphere. As such, we are grateful to those legislators, staff, and department officials with whom MCC collaborated during the legislative session. In light of ongoing difficulties at the national and global stages, both within and outside of the Church, MCC remains committed to finding bipartisan solutions to complex social problems of the day. These efforts can only be accomplished with patience, integrity, and a heart for those who suffer.

MCC is grateful for its episcopal leadership, diocesan clergy, lay leaders, and the many religious men and women that offer kind words of support and encouragement. Truly, "there are many parts, but one body." I hope you find interest in the pages that follow.

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State Budget Activity

Over the course of budget deliberations this legislative session, Michigan Catholic Conference advocated several policies to assist those in need, especially vulnerable women and children, the homeless, low-income families, and students. Below is an overview of those policies and their level of funding in the two budget years of the 2017–2018 session: Fiscal Years 2017–2018 and 2018–2019.

Michigan's Pregnancy and Parenting Support Services Program

• Provided \$1.35 million to a program that supports women in crisis pregnancies and promotes alternatives to abortion.

Children's Clothing Allowance

• Maintained funding in the state budgets to assist Michigan's low-income families who qualify for the Family Independence Program (FIP) to purchase school clothing for children, at \$140 per child per year.

Heat and Eat

• Maximized federal food assistance benefits to approximately 160,000 eligible recipients—including the elderly and persons with disabilities—by offering \$6.4 million in additional state energy assistance.

Homeless Emergency Shelter Per Diem Rate

• Increased the per diem rate for emergency homeless shelters from \$12 to \$16 per bed per night, to improve emergency and transitional services for the homeless.

Per Diem Rates for Foster Care Agencies

• Increased the per diem administrative rate for private foster care agencies that contract with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), such as Catholic Charities, to \$46.20.

Human Trafficking Awareness and Victim Services

• Allocated \$1.18 million to maintain the Human Trafficking Commission and to fund human trafficking intervention services.

School Health and Safety Mandates

- Appropriated \$2,750,000 to nonpublic schools for State health, safety, and welfare mandates.
- Allocated \$50 million for safety grants, available to all types of schools.
- Created a new \$30 million School Mental Health and Support Services Fund to improve mental health outcomes and support K-12 students in all schools.

Shared Time Instruction

• Included \$245 million in shared time funding, which allows a nonpublic or homeschooled student to enroll in a nonessential class, coordinated through a public school.

Dual Enrollment

• Included \$4 million for nonpublic school students to take advantage of dual enrollment, or courses for college credit during high school.

Robotics Grants

• Provided \$600,000 in new robotics grant funding for nonpublic schools, which helps with competition costs and stipends for coaches.

College Tuition Assistance

- Disbursed \$122.6 million to the Tuition Incentive Program to assist Medicaid-eligible students with tuition costs for the first two years of college.
- Provided approximately \$76 million for the Tuition Grant Program, which helps low-income students attend one of Michigan's independent colleges or universities, including Catholic schools.

Bills Signed Into Law

Safe Delivery Update Sup

• Updates Michigan's Safe Delivery Act—which allows parents to surrender a newborn child to an emergency service provider—and enacts greater confidentially provisions.

- Prohibits female genital mutilation (FGM) on a minor or the transportation of a minor for FGM in state law.
- Revokes a medical professional's license for those convicted of performing FGM.
- Requires the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to develop and administer a public education program about FGM.
- Supports the United Nations' efforts to eliminate FGM.

Stillborn Tax Credit

Support

HB 4522 → PA 589 of 2018

- Allows a Michigan taxpayer to claim a one-time personal exemption for a stillborn child.
- Helps parents meet costs accompanying the loss (i.e. prenatal care and funeral expenses).

Bills Vetoed

MCC took positions on the following bills, which were vetoed by Governor Snyder.

• Removes the December 31, 2018 sunset on the webcam abortion ban and helps protect women's safety.

Newborn Safety Device

- Allows newborns to be surrendered to a safety delivery device at a hospital or location staffed 24/7. The device locks and notifies the provider within thirty seconds.
- Allows a baby to be surrendered during his/her first thirty days (current law allows surrender for the first three).

Perinatal Hospice	Support	SB 367
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- Requires medically-accurate information about treatment, support, and assistance to be given to parents whose child has a prenatally diagnosed condition.
- Provides referral information to perinatal hospice programs, which allows families whose child is likely to die before or shortly after birth to go through the natural grieving process.

Support

- Prohibits the State from contracting with providers that offer abortions.
- Includes dismemberment abortion in Michigan's partial-birth abortion ban.
- Adds more physical complications that must be reported after an abortion.

- Removes the twenty-four hour waiting period for abortions.
- Repeals the abortion insurance opt-out, which has prevented health plans on the Affordable Care Act's state health care exchange from including coverage for elective abortions.
- Prohibit laws or administrative rules that place a burden on access to abortion.
- Requires organizations, such as pregnancy centers, to provide notice to their clients that they are not licensed as a health facility.

- Affordable and accessible transportation options for low- and moderate-income workers.

Bills Signed Into Law

MCC took positions on the following bills, which passed the Legislature and were signed into law.

Food Excise Tax Ban

• Prevents local governments from imposing taxes or fees on the manufacturing, distribution, or sale of food, which typically have a disproportional effect on the poor and vulnerable.

- Addresses imposter unemployment claims, amends penalties for fraud, and provides access to advocacy services for those falsely accused of unemployment fraud.

Meals on Wheels	Resolution
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• Urges the U.S. Congress to continue Meals on Wheels and signals that a program addressing hunger, isolation, and loss of independence for the elderly is worth maintaining.

• Preserves and increases Michigan's personal exemption to address changes needed after the passage of the federal Tax Cut and Jobs Act of 2017.

MCC FEATURED ADVOCACY

FIP Grace Period

SB 752 → PA 574 of 2018

Senate Bill 752, a measure championed by Michigan Catholic Conference (MCC), became Public Act 574 of 2018 in December with the governor's signature. This pro-marriage, anti-poverty bill assists low-income families in Michigan's Family Independence Program (FIP). Previous policy forced low-income couples with children to choose between getting married or retaining needed cash assistance benefits for their kids, creating a disincentive for marriage. As a result, MCC staff approached Senator Wayne Schmidt (R-Traverse City) with the idea of SB 752. The bill allows the State of Michigan to temporarily "disregard" a new spouse's income when determining the family's FIP eligibility, for a period of eighteen months. Throughout 2018, MCC testified with Senator Schmidt on behalf of the legislation in the Senate Families, Seniors and Human Services Committee and the House Families, Children, and Seniors Committee. Staff offered language suggestions, worked with interested stakeholders to address any concerns, and met with lawmakers to help move the bill through the process.

Weatherization Assistance

- Extends the previous year's provision for determining weatherization funds to Fiscal Year 2021–2022, which help low-income individuals receive a credit for home heating fuel costs.
- Encourages low-income families to improve energy efficiency and to reduce energy costs.

• Tightens the state's signature-gathering process for ballot proposals, to limit out-of-state paid circulators and to ensure that ballot proposals represent the will of Michiganders.

Note: After concerns with the language as initially introduced, MCC helped improve provisions for volunteer signature-gathers and time frames for submission, which allowed the Conference to support the bill.

Medicaid Work Requirement

• Introduces work requirements on able-bodied recipients of the expanded Medicaid program, Healthy Michigan, who are between the ages of nineteen and sixty-two.

Oppose

• Requires these recipients to participate in approved work-related activities for an average of eighty hours a month and outlines exemptions.

Bills Vetoed

MCC took positions on the following bills, which were vetoed by Governor Snyder.

Charitable Gaming

- Creates standards for charities and contracting companies regarding gaming operations.
- Addresses concerns with restrictive rules that hinder charities' ability to raise money.

Donor Privacy

- Prohibits local and state government agencies from requiring nonprofit organizations to turn over their contributor lists, except through criminal warrants or discovery in a lawsuit.
- Allows individuals to support churches and charities without fear of retribution or intimidation.

Bills Supported/Opposed

MCC took positions on the following bills, which were considered but not enacted during session.

Knights of Columbus Plate

Allows for State-sponsored fundraising license plates, whose proceeds would be directed to specific charitable causes. The Knights of Columbus were included in these proposals at first, but in later versions, were removed due to concerns with the start-up fees required.

Charitable Giving Tax Credit Support

• Provides a nonrefundable tax credit for contributions to food banks, homeless shelters, or community foundations that help those in need.

- Removes the cap on how much residential solar power can enter the grid, also known as net metering.
- Provides people who sell power back to the grid a fair price for their energy.

Bills Supported/Opposed

Lawmakers took no action on the following bills that were introduced and referred to committee.

Application of Foreign Laws	Oppose	HB 4499
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- Restricts courts, arbitrators, and mediators from using "foreign laws" in a decision, if they could be interpreted to violate a person's civil rights under the Michigan or U.S. Constitution.
- Allows civil courts to interpret church canon law decisions (i.e. parish closings).

Contraceptive Mandate	Oppose	HBs 5610-5612, 4799; SBs 832-833, 835, 458
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- Forbids employers from requiring disclosure about employee use or nonuse of contraceptives.
- Requires pharmacies to provide contraceptives, if in stock, or accommodate the individuals' preference for receiving the contraceptives in a timely manner.
- Requires employers to provide information about insurance coverage for prescription contraception.

• Details what types of contraceptive coverage and services insurance plans must cover.

Repeal of Adoption Conscience Measures Oppose HBs 6230–6232

- Prohibits a child-placement agency from declining to participate in adoptions based on religious or moral convictions.
- Allows for actions against child-placement agencies that refuse to participate in an adoption based on religious or moral convictions.

Additional Action

Public Comment Period on Michigan Civil Rights Act

During this session, MCC submitted a letter to the Michigan Civil Rights Commission urging that body to refrain from reinterpreting the state's Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act. The letter was sent during a public comment period, scheduled in response to a request for the Commission to interpret the meaning of the word "sex" in the Act to include gender identity and sexual orientation. MCC was concerned that an effort from the Michigan Civil Rights Commission to reinterpret the law went beyond the Commission's power and would disregard necessary religious liberty protections. While the Commission did vote in favor of reinterpreting the statute, the body's decision is not binding, nor does it have the force of law.



EDUCATION POLICY

- Reimbursement to nonpublic schools for state mandated, noninstructional services, including policies which protect the health, safety, and well-being of students.
- Appointment of a state ombudsman within the Michigan Department of Education to ensure equitable participation of the nonpublic school community in federally funded programs.
- Maximized opportunities of nonpublic school students to participate in comprehensive shared time services.
- Policies that seek to improve the quality of public education and ensure parental rights within the public school setting.
- Requirement that all public school districts have open enrollment policies.
- Protection of nonpublic schools from excessive regulation.
- Adequate funding for the Michigan Tuition Grant and Incentive Programs.
- Amending Article VIII, Section II of the Michigan Constitution to allow the Michigan Legislature greater flexibility for necessary education reforms.

EDUCATION POLICY

Bills Signed Into Law

MCC took positions on the following bills, which passed the Legislature and were signed into law.

School Sale and Deed Restrictions

Support

SBs 249, 702 → PA 98 of 2017; PA 7 of 2018

HB 4735 \rightarrow PA 11 of 2018

- Prevents a local government from denying or requiring a school district to sell, lease, or rent property to an educational institution or private school solely because of its intended use for a lawful educational purpose.
- Prohibits local governments from placing deed restrictions for the same purpose.

Cross Border Dual Enrollment

- Codifies a previous budget policy that public school students in districts at the Michigan border can dual enroll in secondary institutions outside of the state (within twenty miles).
- Offers this expanded educational opportunity to nonpublic schools within border districts.

School Violence Prevention and Safety

- Creates the School Safety Commission within the Department of State Police and enacts confidentiality provisions for school safety information.
- Requires public and nonpublic schools to designate a liaison to work with the School Safety Commission to identify model school safety practices.
- Creates the Office of School Safety to develop model school safety practices and training, to apply for federal funding, and to disburse school safety grants.
- Requires emergency contact information to be updated with the Michigan State Police twice a year.

Elimination of the OK2Say Sunset

- Maintains in law the OK2Say program, which is a hotline for individuals to confidentially report potential harm, criminal acts, or self-harm impacting students and staff.
- Prevents the Act's October 2021 sunset and improves safety for all Michigan's schools.

School Safety Protections

- Requires a school district or public school academy to report certain incidents of crime.
- Outlines that the Office of School Safety would compile a report at least quarterly for the School Safety Commission, the Michigan State Police, and other law enforcement agencies.
- Increases penalties for threatening violent acts against school students, employees, or property with a dangerous weapon.

Active Shooter Training

Bills Signed Into Law

MCC took positions on the following bills, which passed the Legislature and were signed into law.

Recidivism Package SBs 16, 5–10, 12–13, 15, 17–24 → PAs 1–18 of 2017

- Modifies penalties for probationers who commit technical probation violations.
- Defines recidivism and provides specialty rehabilitative programming for young prisoners.
- Encourages implementation of evidence-based supervision practices.
- Expands participation in the "Swift and Sure" Probation Supervision Program, an intensive program for high-risk felony offenders with a history of probation violations or failures.

Expert Witness	Testimony
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- Allows expert witness testimony on the behavioral pattern of human trafficking victims to be submitted as evidence during a criminal trial.
- Improves understanding around trauma in human trafficking cases for the judge and jury.

Prostitution	Exemption	Suppor
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- Eliminates a previous exemption in state law, which had allowed on-duty police officers to be immune from prosecution if they had sex with a prostitute during an investigation.

Note: Mcc opposed aspects of SB 872 as introduced, which would have allowed a window of time for the civil statute of limitations to be applied retroactively. As enacted, the bill allows a minor victim of criminal sexual conduct who was abused by a physician between 1996–2016 to file an action for damages within ninety days of the bill's enactment.

While time ran out this legislative session before the "Raise the Age" package could be adopted by the full Michigan Legislature, juvenile justice reform gained significant momentum. The "Raise the Age" bills, among other aspects, would have allowed most seventeen-year-olds to be handled and treated within the juvenile system, except in the most serious cases; ensured youth under twenty-one could receive age-appropriate programming and outdoor exercise; and established a family advisory board within the Michigan Department of Corrections. MCC, as part of a larger coalition of organizations in support of the bill package, raised awareness and support for "Raise the Age" reform with lawmakers on both sides of the aisle. Staff actively participated in strategy meetings, wrote opinion pieces, gave radio interviews, and shared information on social media about the bills. Additionally, through the larger Coalition's advocacy, almost 2,000 messages were sent from Michigan residents to their state lawmakers, asking them to act on this policy. McC will continue to work in the next legislative session on this important measure.



House Bill 4607

Modifies the age of juvenile court jurisdiction and location of juvenile on in some instances.

Opioid Abuse Prevention

Opioids are highly addictive prescription drugs used for pain relief. In addition to carrying the potential for dependence, opioid use is often a gateway to illegal drugs, such as heroin. The 2017–2018 legislative session produced bipartisan solutions to curb opioid abuse and assist those struggling with addiction. MCC dedicated its June 2017 FOCUS publication to the topic, which was distributed to Catholic schools, parishes, elected officials, and members of the statewide news media. Staff also wrote a letter to lawmakers, commending their attention to the topic and urging continued action. This session, Michigan adopted new laws that:

- Limit opioid prescriptions and allow pharmacists to use professional judgment in filling additional refills.
- Require parental consent before prescribing an opioid to a minor for the first time.
- Require a licensed prescriber to review a patient's MAPS¹⁵ report and to have a bona fide relationship with the patient before prescribing a controlled substance.
- Direct prescribers to provide information on substance use disorder services to patients treated for an opioid overdose and directs the Department of Education to offer instruction on opioid abuse.
- Allow Medicaid to cover opioid use disorders.
