Organizational Support:

- Equipping supervisors across child and family programs.
- Refugee Foster Care
- Traditional Foster Care (statewide)
- Homeless population (SE Michigan)
- Women's re-integration SE Michigan)

Foreign-born victim services:

- Refugee Foster Care Program:
 - Since 2001, trained and equipped to place identified foreign-born victims here without parents/ relatives
- Federally funded
- Comprehensive, holistic case management
- Coordination of housing, legal, medical and other services

Identification Tools

- Taking a closer look
 - o Being curious and aware
- General clues to identifying trafficking when you see it
 - Evidence of being controlled physically or psychologically
 - o Unable to speak for oneself. Someone else controls ID documents.
- Social service providers incorporate screening questions into intake process/review of cases
- Utilize Comprehensive Human Trafficking Assessment (or a similar tool another was developed by VERA Institute for Justice)



Identifying Needs

- Basic Needs
 - Safety
 - Housing
 - o Identification
 - o Food & Clothing
 - o Medical & Dental
- Emotional/Social
 - o Acceptance/love
 - Therapeutic/Trauma treatment
 - o Case Management
 - Connection to a support network – peer survivors, mentors, faith community, etc.
 - Development of life skills communication, conflict resolution, etc.
 - o Above all time

- Legal Needs
 - o Immigration
 - Coordination with law enforcement, representation for victim rights, advocacy, vacate past charges
 - o Litigation/restitution
- Education/Employment
 - Entry into appropriate educational programing
 - Support services in educational setting
 - Life skills around interviewing, resume writing, job coaching
 - Assistance with finding employment
 - Career development

Critical Components of Services

- Be person-centered!
- Be trauma informed... if you have not yet studied trauma, especially complex and chronic trauma and the effects on the brain, the body, everything you MUST when working with survivors
- Develop cultural competency
- Case Management/Coordination
 - Be collaborative
 - Provide control to the survivor
 - o Include peer support and leadership development
- Therapeutic strategies
 - o Effective interventions include art therapy, TF-CBT, DBT, EMDR, etc.
 - Be trauma-informed and strength-based

You can't do this alone

- Collaborate with other organizations
- Develop relationships with law enforcement
- Know your legal providers
- Know your service providers
- Know entities that operate more freely (outside funding challenges), such as faith groups
- Help the survivor build their own support network
